# SHIGA TOXIN-PRODUCING E. COLI INFECTION

## WHAT ARE SHIGA TOXIN-PRODUCING E. COLI?


- *E. coli* are bacteria that live in the environment, food and intestines of humans and animals.
- Shiga toxin-producing E. coli are specific kinds of E. coli that cause disease by producing a toxin called Shiga toxin.

#### WHAT ARE THE SYMPTOMS?

- Diarrhea (often bloody).
- Mild to severe stomach cramps.
- · Vomiting.

#### **HOW IS THE INFECTION SPREAD?**

- Eating foods contaminated with feces.
- Eating undercooked meat, especially ground beef, or meat that has been needle-tenderized.
- Consuming unpasteurized (raw) dairy products (like milk), juice or cider
- Having contact with cattle or other animals.
- Having contact with the feces of an infected person.
- Swimming in or drinking sewage-contaminated water.



#### **HOW CAN I PREVENT INFECTION?**

- Wash hands with soap and warm water:
  - $\Rightarrow$  before touching food.
  - ⇒ before touching a baby bottle or pacifier.
  - $\Rightarrow$  after going to the bathroom.
  - $\Rightarrow$  after changing diapers.
  - ⇒ after touching animals or their environments.
  - ⇒ after touching raw meats.
- Keep raw meats separate from ready-to-eat foods.
- Cook all meats thoroughly. Use a meat thermometer. Ground beef should be cooked to an internal temperature of 160°F. Temperature is a better indicator of doneness than color.
- Refrigerate food promptly.
- Wash all produce thoroughly, even if it does not look dirty.
- Do not consume unpasteurized milk or other dairy products.
- Do not drink unpasteurized juice or cider.
- Disinfect food-preparation surfaces, utensils, and diaper changing stations after each use.
- Properly dispose of diapers in a closed-lid garbage can.
- Do not allow an infected person to work in daycare settings, patient care, or food-handling.
- Properly chlorinate your swimming pool.
- Do not swallow lake or pool water while swimming.
- Do not drink untreated water.
